A SAVIOR IS BORN!

MY DEAR SISTERS AND BROTHERS IN JESUS.

MERRY CHRISTMAS! I have a lot of memories of Christmas seasons spent in my younger years. Those memories make me feel nostalgic – and yet they always put a smile on my face. I remember our Christmas tree that was made of branches from an ordinary tree in the backyard. (We did not have fir nor pine trees in our area.) My mom would decorate it with "faux snow" she created out of dried soap suds, and the dust from the suds would make us sneeze every time we got close to the Christmas tree. She would hang plenty of hard candies from the branches, but we were not allowed to pick them until Christmas morning. And then we had a beautiful tradition of holding Novena Masses (9 days) before Christmas. We would wake up at 3AM and walk 3 miles to the church to celebrate Holy Mass at 4AM. It was called "Simbang Gabi" or Misa de Gallo (Dawn Mass as the rooster crows). Christmas season was always a fun and exciting time.

Something I did not understand about Christmas back then was the fact that Jesus was born in a manger. I thought the word "manger" was something beautiful because it was part of a song. Only later did I realize what a manger was: a feeding trough for animals! The new-born King was placed in a trough! It was a picture of poverty – the poverty of God. They always say, "there is no place like home". Home is the place for comfort and safety. Yet, when the Savior of the world was born – the one to whom everything belongs – there was no room available for Him. Mary gave birth in an animals' den, and her Baby was put in a trough. The circumstances surrounding the birth of Jesus says a lot about His life and mission.

Jesus, the Savior, born not in a comfortable home but in a manger speaks to us about life's meaning and purpose. When Jesus came into the world, he offered a reversal of values and called us to look for things that do not perish: the treasures of the Kingdom of Heaven. His poverty was not limited to just being born in a manger. His true poverty was brought about by the rejection that He faced while He was on earth. St. John put it this way, "He came to what was His own, and His own people did not accept Him." (John 1:11) The Gospel of St. Luke was not just about God's Son being born in a poor place but a revelation of what was to happen to this child when He grows up and embarks on His ministry. People who once followed Him would reject Him. (Sadly, some people still reject Him, believers and non-believers alike. Some do not even want to hear the words "Merry Christmas" these days. We pray for them.)

As Christians, we are not to be driven by the values of this world. We are in the world but not of the world. We must break away from those ideologies that do not conform with the world of Jesus. He came into the world to SAVE THE WORLD, not to condemn the world. But He came NOT TO CONDONE the world either. Jesus may have been born in a manger, yet His poverty and humility showed us the way to live our lives. I am glad we still celebrate Christmas every year. We get reminded that JESUS is the REASON FOR CHRISTMAS. He took upon Himself our humanity, so we may experience the blessings of His divinity. It is all because of His great love for you and for me. So, let us rejoice and be grateful — we have Jesus who was born to save us. HAVE A BLESSED AND MERRY CHRISTMAS!


